

Ron W. Goode
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The Honorable Ron W. Goode is the Tribal Chairman of the North Fork Mono Tribe.

He is a Life Member of the Sierra Mono Museum.

He is a veteran of the United States Army, where he served at the rank of E-5 Sargent.

He is retired from Fresno Unified School District as an Outreach Consultant in the Dropout Prevention Program.

Ron holds a Life Credential in Ethnic Studies and is retired from the State Community College School District where he taught American Indian Studies for fifteen years at Fresno City College and Oakhurst Ed. Center, as well as the martial art of Judo.

Ron is a Life member of the United States Judo Federation and teaches Judo with his wife Myra at the Clovis Judo Club. He is a Rokudan (6th degree) and wife Myra is also a Rokudan (6th degree) Black Belt. Daughter Elena and 9-year-old granddaughter Sydney are also in Judo.

Mr. Goode is a published author, an ethnobotany book on native plants and resources: Cultural Traditions Endangered, 1992. A second book on cultural ecology is in the works. Ron is a co-author on other published books, journals and articles.

Ron owns his own archaeological consulting business, Eagle Eye Enterprises, since 1978, conducting ethnographical research for over fifty years on the Mono culture.

The Hon. Ron Goode has co-developed a State-wide K-12 curriculum called, Lessons of Our California Land Tenure, along with Native American historical DVD interviews and tribal maps.

Mr. Goode is also on the Native American Advisory Committee for the Department of Water Resources for the California Water Plan Update, and a co-founder of the California State Agencies and Tribal Water Summit of 2009 and 2013.

Mr. Goode volunteers his time with five collaborative and tribal forums enhancing the ecological environment, watersheds, and cultural resources of the forests, Parks and tribal lands. Ron's work with Stanford University regarding fire regimes and cross cultural collaborations with the Martu of Australia recently allowed for his visit to Australia as a guest speaker for two symposiums with the National Australian Universities. Ron and his tribal members have been restoring ten cultural resource sites including meadow restorations on Forest Lands over the past fourteen years.
